Russ Lepard

Three tribes of cacti are named by modern taxonomists: Pereskieae, Opuntieae, and Cereeae. All are members of Cactaceae family. The pereskias are often singled out because of their distinct appearance. Their growing requirements are warmth and plenty of water from spring to autumn, but allow soil to dry between waterings in winter. (they will not tolerate temperatures below 50P., leaves will drop) They will succeed in almost any reasonable soil. They are at their best when given plenty of root room. Pereskias are basically undemanding smalltrees, shrubby or climbing vining plants. Pereskia bleo ( wax rose of Panama) Tree-size habit reaching 15' or more. Rose colored flowers. May be used as understock for grafting epiphyllums. Pereskia guamacho also grows as a little tree up to 16' high. Bark and branches are yellowish-green, old areoles stand out like sm all knobs filled with brown felt and rigid spines. Flowers are yellow and close at night. The trunk grows up to 15° in diameter and is used for wood. Pereskia aculeata ( lemon vine) also known as the Barbados Gooseberry, eaten throughout the West Indies. This pereskia is most widely cultivated. It has a sprawling, vining habit. Tiny but showy, strongly lemon cented flowers are white, yellow and sometimes pink. Leaves are cooked as a pot herb in Brazil. This species was grown in the Royal Gardens at Hampton Court before 1696.

Altogether there 19 species of Pereskieae. First one being Pereskii Pereskii Others being P. conzattii, P.corrugata, P.grandifolia, and P.guamachio

Propagation is generally by seed but root easily from cuttings taken in warm weather and placed in water.

The primitive, leafy pereskias appear to be the last link between cacti as we recognize them today. Like other cacti, they have both areoles and spines straight ones for protection and hooked ones for climbing. Because of their thorny woody stems and sprawling habit, they resemble rose bushes. Often used as living fences or hedges to keep livestock in, and as a rootstock for grafting ornamental epiphytic cacti.
