June 16 & 17, OUR OWN CACTUS & SUCCULENT SHOW AND SALE! Lots more info. to come



# The 1984 Question

Has everyone heard the question about being marooned on a desert island; and if you were, what one book would you take to read? Well, updating this for Orwell's 1984, suppose the "Government" decreed we could each keep only one cactus and one succulent. Which two would you cherish above all others?

I think I would choose a scurfy grey Astrophytum for its lovely blooms each year, its symmetry,

its speckled body, and its thoughtful way of not (usually) curling up its toes (roots) and dropping dead. On the other hand, Astros generally don't seem to be self-fertile nor do they offset while growing on their own roots. At least mine don't. But I'd still choose an Astro. Maybe I'd even try to top it, reroot it, and force it to pup on its "lower" half.

As for the one succulent - I'd choose one of the common leaf succulents - perhaps a fuzzy Kalanchoe tomentosa - the Panda - or an Echeveria hybrid, flower of all the succulents. Pushed to the wall, I'd choose the Panda. No, wait, the Echeveria......

Also I'd plant some living stones high and dry - some Lithops and Pleispilos, and if questioned I'd say, "Plants? What plants? Do you see any plants, Officer?"

Which two would YOU keep? Would you keep the rare succulent and carefully nurture it for posterity? Or would you choose an easily propagated plant and populate a whole garden? Would you choose beauty? Or would you simply choose the one you loved most?
