President' Message for October

Thank the Officers, Chairs, Liaisons and members who stayed for the September Board meeting; their participation was and will be essential in the transformation our Club is going through. A 19<sup>th</sup> century Englishman named Henry Martyn Robert must be turning over in his grave after I ran roughshod over the wonderful Rules he wrote in 1876. Briefly, here's what your Board approved. If you want more background, feel free to call me and start attending Board meetings. We approved the organization chart included in this Newsletter. Our fiscal year and terms of office will start July 1. We'll elect officers May, install in June, and they'll take over July 1, 2011. Except for the Treasurer, all current Officers have agreed to stay 6 months.

I now have two important positions to fill. We need a <u>Finance Chair</u> and before the end of the year, and a <u>Treasurer</u>. The Finance Chair requires only a modicum of financial knowledge, and a willingness to prepare an annual budget and financial report with the help of the Board. I think Marsha Huebner will agree with me that the Treasurer, in addition to be trustworthy mostly needs to collect income, deposit it, write checks; and keep a record of those activities. And pay Sales taxes once a year. I'm sure Marsha will be willing to provide guidance in this matter.

Last month I attended the 2-day CGCI Fall Board meeting in Palm Springs where about 130 CGCI members (mostly holding State and District positions) met to report and discuss current activities. I attended 3 sessions of the Board of Directors lasting in total six hours. I was amazed that over 25 Committees, Teams and Chairs had reports and not all existing CGCI elements reported. Some were focused on the internal workings of the organization but most involved activities involved in community, regional and statewide projects. I came to the conclusion that we are extremely fortunate to have our Club activities entirely supported by one annual sale. Most clubs seem to raise funds internally through various methods from their members.

I learned a lot by attending a Leadership workshop and you all will benefit or suffer – depending on your point of view from the many notes and ideas I scribbled down.



27<sup>th</sup> Annual Succulent Plants Symposium—in Retrospect By Vera Thaxton

Last year, smoke from the deadly Station Fire hung over the Huntington as people gathered for the Annual Succulent Symposium. In contrast, a record 175 participants were greeted September 4 of this year with blue sky and people-friendly temperature; a great way to begin a memorable day! For South Coast Cactus and Succulent Society, it was a noteworthy event in that no less than seven members were present: MARIA COPALDO, JIM HANNA, DICK KOHLSCREIBER, DALE LA FOREST, VERA THAXTON, EUNICE THOMPSON, and LAUREL WOODLEY. Hopefully, even more of the membership will participate next year!

Following a welcome by JIM FOLSOM, Director of the Gardens, the various speakers presented illustrated studies relating to a variety of environments in the world. DAN MAHR, of Sun Prairie, WI, introduced the group to Bonaire, an island in the Netherlands Antilles known primarily for fantastic scuba diving. This is a very small island formed by volcanic action that is completely lacking sandy beaches, but provides a home for 380 species of plants. A fair amount of agriculture, cows, and the cutting or wood for charcoal have affected the amount of vegetation. Melocactus, aloe, a columnar forest, and several kinds of opuntia are present. Flamingoes, parakeets, and iguanas are some of the wildlife found in the area.

Whereas Dan's presentation was entitled "Stranded on a Desert Island, SULA VANDERPLUNK, of Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden, concentrated her remarks on the west coast of Baja: "Where the Chaparrel' Meets the Desert." Although largely uninhabited now, except for a number of cactus and succulents including ferocactus, fouqueria, columnaris, dudleya, echinocereus, and agave, this area is targeted for urban expansion associated with the construction of an international airport in the vicinity of San Quintin. The Mexican government is considering establishment of a protected area in order to avoid loss of valuable species.

JOHN LAVRONOS, known for organizing field trips to areas of highly concentrated cacti and succulents as well as outstanding photography and keen sense of humor, entitled his presentation: Arabia Felix". It related primarily to Yemen; its spectacular architecture and land masses, beautiful flowers, euphorbias, and stapelias..

AMMY KORN and MATT RANDOLPH of Pasadena presented "Gateway to the Desert Garden" which related to changes to be made in the development of the Huntington's prized cactus and succulent gardens. One of the concerns to be addressed was that of accessability.

The presentations were all educational and very enjoyable, the food was delicious, visits to the Desert Garden were enlightening, the conversations were lively, the nursery made purchases of c actus and succulents easy, and the afternoon refreshments were WELCOMED!! In other words, for cactophiles and succulent enthusiasts of all stripes, the 27<sup>th</sup> Annual Succulent Symposium constituted a VERY enjoyable and well-spent day!!!

#### OCTOBER REFRESHMENTS




"THAT'S NOT MY JOB"

PLANT OF THE MONTH RULES - revised Jan 2010

I In to 3 plants may be entered in each of the two categories – cactus and succulent.

Entries may be in either the Novice or Open class.

Novice entries must have been held by the owner for at least 3 months. Only plant condition will be judged, not the pot or other enhancements.

Open entries must have been held for at least 1 year. All aspects of the entry will be judged, including plant condition, and pot.

Note: Members showing in the Open class may not enter plants in the Novice class during the year, but may re-enter the Novice class starting in January.

> Judging

Entrants will receive 6 points for first place, 4 points for second place, 2 points for third place and 1 point for showing a plant that is not disqualified.

The judge may award one 1<sup>st</sup> place and up to two 2<sup>nd</sup> and two 3<sup>rd</sup> places in each category. If plants are not deemed to be of sufficient quality, no place will be awarded.

At the discretion of the judge and for Mini-show Chair a plant may be disqualified or removed due to disease or infestation or occause it is not of the correct genera.
