Dear Society Members: This is a general list of job descriptions for the upcoming Show & Sale, April 23-24. Please read this over to find a job you would like to do. We would like to spend some time at the upcoming meetings getting volunteers assigned to the various jobs. FRIDAY SETUP -

Arrive Friday, April 22nd at 1:00 PM to help arrange the tables, put up signs. General helping of show organizing.

SOCIETY SALE TABLE: These are plants society members have donated. The table needs to be set up with tablecloths and plant tags by Friday afternoon. (All are provided by the society.) Members can bring in their plants starting Friday afternoon. Saturday morning help arrange the plants on the table and make sure they are pest free. On Saturday and Sunday, keep an eye on the plants, answer general questions about the plants and keep table looking nice

CASHIERS

Check out buyers by ringing up the cost on the tags, adding up the total with tax and collecting cash and checks. Experience with a cash register advised. Credit card person will run the cards and give receipts.

TAG PULLERS

We need many people to help pull tags in different shifts. Tags are in the plants the buyers are purchasing. Pullers need to pull the tags, count them and make sure that number matches the number of plants to be purchased.

- HOSPITALITY/MEMBERSHIP/ T-SHIRTS -

Volunteers will help with new memberships or sell T-shirts Answer general questions and direct guests to features of the event.

PRESALE PLANT HOLDING AREA

These volunteers will help watch that buyers only take their plants and not pick and choose from other people's plants in the holding area. Can be a sitting job.

OUTDOOR HOLDING PLANTS

Hold plants for those who need to drive their car up to parking lot to load plants in their car. Sign up for shifts.

CLEAN UP

At 4 PM Sunday we close the show/sale. We need volunteers to help take down signs, clean off tables, sweep and general clean up. Pack up rented tables.



Sulcorebutia: A Virtual Tour through Bolivia.




Jackson Burkholder has been growing cacti and succulents for over twenty years. He grew up attending Colorado Cactus and Succulent Society events, and what started as one or two small plants every year has turned into an obsession with desert flora. Since middle school Jackson has been active in the Colorado Cactus and Succulent Society serving as Show and Sale Chair, Vice President, Show Chair, and has been a Show Judge for the past 6 years. Jackson is also an active member of Cactus and Succulent Society of America and has been on its board of directors since 2020.

Jackson recently graduated from Colorado State University with a degree in Horticulture and minors in Botany and Japanese. He is currently starting on Precision Cactus Growers, a nursery that will specialize in producing cactus seeds and plants with collection and location data. His plants are distributed between a small greenhouse and multiple cold frames where his current focus is on South American cacti that thrive in the high elevations and cool nights of Colorado as well as wintery hardy plants.

In addition to growing plants Jackson is also interested in restoring and using antique scientific equipment and experimenting with traditional scientific techniques. He combines both of his passions by studying plant anatomy and histology - making and examining microscope slides of different plant tissues and organs. He is currently working on finishing the research for his master's thesis in this subject on the anatomy of cactus extrafloral nectaries. He has many additional research projects coming up and is also working on a book about cactus biology and cultivation directed towards a hobbyist audience.

In his presentation titled **"Sulcorebutia: a Virtual Tour though Bolivia"**, Jackson will start by introducing some of the taxonomy and biology of the genus Sulcorebutia, a group of plants that has more recently been included in Rebutia and Weingartia. Next he will talk about some of the special care that these plants require in order to do well and put on large flowering displays. Finally his talk will conclude with a "virtual tour of Bolivia": a slide show of plants from Jackson's collection grouped by locality to reflect which species can been seen in vicinity of one another in nature.







Monthly Cactus: Stenocactus

[Ed: All species in the genus Echinofossulocactus have been moved to other genera; most have been moved to Stenocactus. Plants that were bought labeled as Echinofossulocactus can be entered into the Mini-Show using that name, however it would preferable to use the new name. The website Llifle can be used to find the new name click here.]

Stenocactus is a genus of northern and central Mexican cacti of around 10 species related to Ferocactus. It now includes Hertrichocereus and Echinofossulocactus. They are mostly small globular cactus, of very variable characteristics, generally below 4 inches in diameter (10 cm), often solitary, but sometimes clustering as they age. The name echinofossulocactus comes from the Latine for 'Echinocactus with a little ditch', referring to the small wrinkle extending from the top of the areola in some species. They contain the wave cacti, also called brain cacti, that are so named because of their large number of undulating ribs.

The short funnel-shaped flowers are generally striped with a darker median line and, just above 1 inch across (2.5 cm). These flowers come in late summer and last 3-4 days. Stenocactus are not always self-fertile, so you might need to have several non related plants flowering at the same time, in order to get seeds. The seeds come in green pods.

They are propagated by seeds that germinate easily.

Monthly Cactus: Stenocactus

Echinofossulocactus is now included in the genus Echinocactus and Stenocactus.


Echinofossulocactus is a Central to Northern Mexican genus. Plants from the genus Echinofossulocactus are easily recognized by their thin wavy ribs. For several years the entire genus was known by the alternative name Stenocactus, and species can still be found with this name. The genus is closely related to Ferocactus, differing by the lack of nectar glands the lack of a ring of hairs above the stamens, and size.

Echinofossulocacti grow in grass lands, and need some protection from full sun. Individual plants can vary considerably within a species and this makes identification in this genus notoriously difficult. For the most part, they tend to look alike, and there are far more names than there are species. However, a few species do stand out.

Due to a long and convoluted nomenclatural history, the genus is often still grown and traded among collectors under the genus name Echinofossulocactus.

Monthly Succulent: Euphorbia from Madagascar

This month's 'Plant of The Month' Succulent is Euphorbia from Madagascar. These are plants that are endemic only to the island of Madagascar.


Some of the most interesting euphorbias come from Madagascar.

Although many euphorbias are very easy to grow, some are very difficult, turning immediately to mush when over watered, or watered out of season. Care must be given in watering, keeping them warm and wet while growing, and cooler and dry when dormant. They do best in an open potting mix, with equal parts of pumice, sand and an organic component, or commercial potting soil. Protection in a greenhouse or even a garage for a month or two in the middle of the winter will greatly increase the survival rate.


Most euphorbias are easy to propagate. The green stems can be removed, left to dry for at least week or even a bit more, and then replanted. The newly planted stems take a few weeks to establish, and then start growing.

Latin Lookup

Loquerisne Latine (Do you speak Latin)? The meanings of latin plant names on the previous pages – from http://davesgarden.com/guides/botanary/

crispatus [kriss-pah-tuss] Having a wavy edge.

multicostatus [mul-tee-koh-STAY-tus] Many ribs.

obvallatus [ob-val-LAY-tus] Surrounded; guarded or enclosed.

Stenocactus [sten-oh-KAK-tus] Thin cactus. sulphureus [sul-FER-ee-us] Sulphur yellow.

tricuspidatus [try-kusp-ee-DAY-tus, try-kusp-ih-DAH-tus] Three-pointed.

vaupelianus [voh-pel-ee-AH-nus] Named for Friedrich Carl (or Karl) Johann Vaupel, early 20th century German scientist and plant collector. **ambovombensis** [am-boh-vom-BEN-sis] Of or from Ambovombe (Madagascar).

cylindrifolia [sil-Iin-drih-FOH-lee-uh] Having leaves that are cylindrical or slightly tapering.

Euphorbia [yoo-FOR-bee-uh] Named for Euphorbus, Greek physician to Juba II, King of Mauretania.

francoisii [fran-KOY-see-eye] For E. Francois, who owned the farm near Fort Dauphin, Madagascar where the Euphorbia taxon was first discovered.

leuconeura [loo-koh-NOOR-uh, loo-koh-NYUR-uh] White veined (or nerved).

milii [MIL-ee-eye]

Named for M. le baron Milius, Governor of Isle Bourbon, present-day Isle de la Reunion (Reunion Island).

primulifolia [prim-yoo-lih-FOH-lee-uh] Having flowers like a Primula (primrose).
