Steven Frieze has been involved with collection, sales and propagation of cacti and succulents for over thirty years. He is a lifetime member of the Los Angeles Cacti and Succulent Society where he served as the President of this club for a number of years and as its newsletter editor for several more. Steven was one of the founding owners of Desert Creations, an exotic cactus and succulent nursery. Steven has made several plant related expeditions to exotic locals such as Chile, East Africa, South Africa, Oaxaca Mexico, Cost Rica, and Brazil. He and his wife have started Distinctive Flora, a plant business that specializes in exotic plants such as tillandsias, bromeliads, cacti and succulents.

Prior to his retirement in 2006, Steven was an Administrator for the California State University system serving in a variety of capacities in the area of institutional research. Subsequent to his retirement he has joined the Psychology Department at California State University, Dominguez Hills as an adjunct faculty member where he still teaches. He also functions as the Director of the Positive Psychology Lab at the same institution where students get the opportunity to design and execute psychological research studies.

Monthly Cactus: Crested and Montrose

Crested and monstrose is the occurrence of growth mutations throughout the plant kingdom, but we happen to be most interested in the topic as it applies to succulents, especially cacti and euphorbias, aeoniums, echeverias, and other succulents too. Crested and monstrose plants are those that exhibit abnormal, distorted or disfigured growth. This happens when a mutation occurs during cell division. But rather than perfectly flat layers of tissue resulting, the damage to the central growing point creates multiple growing points that crowd and push against each other. Peculiar shapes form from this energy such as those resembling brains, fans, coral, and snakes.

Monthly Succulent: Crested and Montrose

In monstrose growth, the mutation typically makes random multiple growing points that are not stacked next to each other — there's one here, another over there, pushing the body of the plant all out of shape in disorderly fashion. The crested and monstrose forms generally occur because of injuries to the plant at a young age. In reaction to this injury, the cells at the tip of the branch where growth occurs begin to multiply at a much faster rate and the normal growing tip creates crested plants.

In monstrose specimens, each of those growth tips behaves as if it were the primary point. The result is messy, lumpy, monster-like growth. Cristates look more neat and symmetrical in comparison.

Plants can exhibit mutated and regular growth at the same time. Crests and monstrose growth are unpredictable; no two are precisely alike. That goes for plants of the same species. (continued next page)

Cactus

cristata [kris-TAY-tuh] Crested.

Echinopsis [ek-in-OP-sis] From the Greek echinos (sea urchin or hedgehog) and opsis (like), referring to the plant's resemblance to sea urchins.

geometrizans [jee-oh-MET-rih-zans] Geometric; having markings in a formal pattern.

Lophocereus [lof-oh-KER-ee-us] From the Greek lophos (crest) cereus (genus name for cactus, meaning torch).

 ${\bf Mammillaria}~[{\bf mam-mil-}{\bf AR-ee-uh}]~{\bf Nipple-}~{\bf or}~{\bf teat-like}.$

microdasys [my-kro-DAS-is] Small and bushy.

monstrosus [mon-STROH-sus] Strange, wonderful; monstrous; also spelled monstruosus.

Myrtillocactus [mir-til-oh-KAK-tus] From the Greek myrtillus (small myrtle) and cactus; referring to the myrtle-like fruits.

mystax [MY-staks] From the Latin, meaning moustache.

Opuntia [op-UN-shee-a, op-UN-tee-a] Named after Opus (Greece), an area where other cactus-like plants were grown.

pallida [PAL-lid-duh] Pale, pallid.

schottii [SHOT-ee-eye] Named for Arthur Carl Victor Schott, 19th century German-born naturalist on the Mexican boundary survey.

Succulent

cristata [kris-TAY-tuh] Crested.

cuspidata [kus-pi-DAY-tuh] Sharp-pointed.

Echeveria [ech-eh-VER-ee-a, ech-eh-ver-EE-a] Named for Anastasio Echeverria y Godoy, 18th century Spanish botanist.

Euphorbia [yoo-FOR-bee-uh] Named for Euphorbus, Greek physician to Juba II, King of Mauretania.

Gasteria [gas-TAIR-ee-uh] From gaster, (belly, stomach); referring to swollen base on flower.

lactea [lak-TAY-uh] Milky.

monstrosa [mon-STROH-sa] Strange, wonderful; monstrous; also spelled monstruosa.

nigricans [ny-grih-kans] Black.

Exhibitors must be club members and must be present at the meeting in order to receive points. One name representing the same household must be used unless plants are grown separately. Mini-show coordinator will be consulted if there is any question of entry identity.

Any container may be used, including plastic, as long as it is clean. All plants must be groomed and free of pests and disease.

There are two plant categories, "Cactus" and "Succulents". Up to three plants per individual may be entered in each category.

There are three entry classes: "Novice", "Intermediate" and "Open".

Only members new to the hobby would be expected to be in the novice class.

After the November meeting, members' point totals will be reviewed by the Board of the Society. Novice members awarded

more than 64 points or winning at least 6 first place awards will be asked to move to the Intermediate class in both categories. Intermediate Members awarded more than 64 points or winning at least 6 first place awards, will be asked to begin showing in the Open class.

All plants must be grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of six months for novice and intermediate and one year for open class. An individual plant may be entered only once a year

Scoring:

First Place: 6 points Second place: 4 points Third place: 2 points **Placement:** all entries that are not disqualified receive one point
