DID YOU KNOW... The First Annual Cactus Show was presented by the Cactus and Succulent Society of America August 29, 30, and 31, 1929; however, due to the enthusiasm shown, it spilled over into September 1st. This was "the first exhibition ever held devoted in its entirety to cacti and their kindred succulents" (taken from the October 1929 CSSA Journal), and was held in the greenpuses of Edward H. Rust Nurseries at Pasadena. Dr. Arthur D. Houghton was how Chairman and J. A. Ekdom of Pasadena was General Manager. There were 134 entries by 63 exhibitors coming from various California areas, and R. E. Hess clear from San Antonio, Texas!! Cactophiles looked forward with high expectation to seeing some of the most choice cacti from the collection of

William Hertrich, Then General Manager of the Huntington Foundation, who judged the show along with James West and Fritz Berger. Among the 61 catepries were some unusual ones such as "Best Comedy Layout," "Best Collection of Freaks," "Best Collection of Plants with Regards to Fancy Pots or Containers," and "Collection of Insect Pests and Parasites, Inimical Moulds and Fungi"!!! There were many varied prizes awarded including cash amounts from \$1 to \$15; Cups; sterling silver cactus spoons; planters, pottery, bowls, and vases; plants such as a large clump of Trichocereus schickendantzii, Lophophora williamsii, Pincenectia tuberculata, and Doryanthes palmeri in a tub; and a "handsome garden smoking set." A few of the special awards given were for 'useful and decorative articles of cactus wood,' 'hand-tinted photos,' an educational exhibit entered by the Agricultural Commissioner of L.A. County: and to George Shaeffer who displayed the edible fruit of "Mexican Opuntia" with jars of canned "desert apples" and piles of the fresh fruit. Interestingly, "desert apples" were raised and shipped to the eastern markets. The 1st Place Sweepstakes award (a Cup presented by Mrs. Sherman Hoyt) seems to have gone to G. A. Frick for a collection of about 65 varieties of Euphorbia. Exhibits of an artistic nature - dish gardens, rockeries, planters, etc. seemed to be popular. A ban was placed on using glazed pots for desert plants. The prize for the "Best and Rarest Plant Shown" was awarded to W. T. Beecroft for his Mammillaria hahniana.
