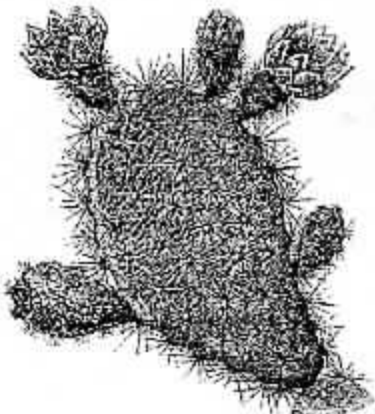

A new book by George Schenk, one of the best-known American garden writers, is called "Gardening on pavement, tables, and hard surfaces". In it, he shows how you can create gardens in just a few inches of soil.

Beth Chatto, a famous British nurserywoman and author, in her book "The Dry Garden", tells of how she created what is now a lush landscape over what had been a paved parking lot (or 'car park', as they say in Britain).

The so-called "green roofs" movement is gaining force in the U.S.—the use of live plants growing on roofs. Succulents such as sempervivums and sedums have been used for this in areas of Europe for a long time, but this is a new thing for us.

So, don't despair that you don't have room for an outdoor cactus and succulent garden. You can have one, if you use your imagination. Fresno newsletter





PLANT-OF-THE-MONTH RULES

- A maximum of three plants may be entered in each category (cactus and succulent).
- Advanced entrants must have had the plant in their possession for at least six months, novices for three months.
- Advanced entrants will receive 6 points for first place, 5 points for second place, 4 points for third place and 2 points for showing a plant that does not place.
- Novice entrants will receive 4 points for first place, 3 points for second place, 2 points for third place and 1 point for showing a plant that does not place.
- At the discretion of the judges there may be up to three third places in-a category. If plants are not deemed to be of sufficient quality, no third place will be awarded.
- For an entrant to receive points, the entry tags must be collected by the person in charge of record keeping for POM.
- At the annual Christmas party, award plants will be presented to the four highest cumulative point holders in both the advanced and novice classes.

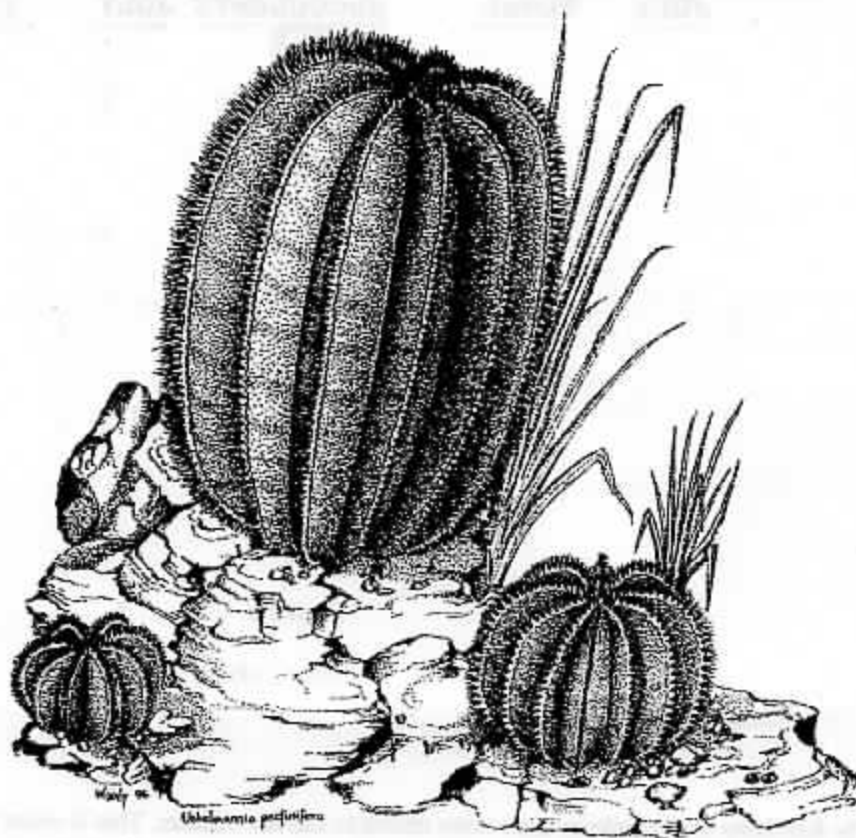
You should be fertilizing your epiphytic cacti every month in the hot weather. This is when they really start to grow. Fish emulsion is suitable. If you have a lot of plants you can use Osmocote, to save time.

Growing Baja plants: Monte Crawford, Apache Junction AZ, offered this comment on the Internet: 'I have traveled Baja and grown Baja plants for years and noticed this daily fog and the ensuing growth it causes. I had never been able to duplicate this in my central Arizona locale. This past year I switched from root watering on all my Fouquierias (including Boojums) and my Pachycormus (all planted in the ground). I installed simple drip irrigation misting heads on tall bamboo stakes next to each plant. I have them set for 30 min. each evening after sunset. The growth is amazing!! I have gotten a full 10-12" on all my Boojums (4' and taller) and the Pachycormus look like nothing I've seen in the U.S. This is not spindly growth that some U.S. nurseries get pushing plants. I am convinced that you can replicate this fog belt with great results.' Fresno Newsletter

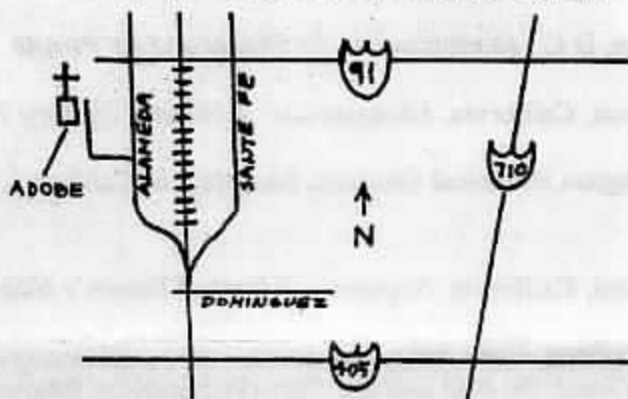
