# President's Message for August 2011

I apologize for the confusion about the starting time for last month's meeting. I have no excuse other then it was a "senior moment" and perhaps I'm juggling too many Club projects. On a more positive note, although attendance was down from last year we still had over 100 in attendance.

As I listened to Paul Ortega speak, I thought about how difficult it could be to replace the normal grass lawns with water thrifty landscaping. I knew that succulents come in many sizes and shapes. Some have long lives, others not. Some flower once, others annually and many have insignificant flowers. So species selection and placement in a yard is critical. As I looked at his photos, I realized that large rocks contribute significantly to the overall effect and wondered if I knew enough about "rocks" to select the right size kind, colors, and textures. And surely "heavy lift" machinery would be required. I also thought about how useful it would be to have a checklist on how to go about planning such a project. It would be useful to have an album of homes that have already done this - both good and bad. Photos of mature plants with names and environmental requirements would be useful. And speaking of environments, our area has many microclimates so a map of these climates might be helpful. Environments also include soil types. If your soil is sandy and drains quickly that's mostly good, although large succulents might not be able to withstand strong winds - another reason for large rocks. If your soil is caliche, clay or rocky, you will need to consider drainage and probably an automatic watering system. Clearly this is not a DIY project. So a

list of reliable and knowleadgeable landscapers and landscape designers would help. I did a quickly search on the Internet and found Debra Lee Baldwin's website most useful. It would be a good place to start.

I appreciated Tanya Finney, SCBG Superintendent, coming in on her day off and leading a tour of the desert garden area.

Jim Hanna, Gary Duke, Hank Warzybok and Dick Kohlschreiber (SCBG) all were selling plants and seemed to be doing a steady business. And I want to tank Laurel Woodley for loaning the use of her computer and projector. Judy Unrine and Irene Brenner hosted the "Club Table" and I think we gained several new members.

Thank all of you who renewed your dues in June. A few stragglers paid in July and by now Lucy will have finalized the roster. I expect some members chose not to renew, but we continue to gain new members every month, so I expect our total membership won't change much. The total membership number is important because it's how we compute our CGCI dues. The Membership Committee (Lucy) is redoing all the Name Plates/tags. They should be ready for the August meeting.

**Rules for Miniatures** - The Plants of the Month for August are miniatures (under 3"). They should be mature plants in up to 3" pots. This means that the pot is 3" or smaller across. This is measured on the inside edge of the pot. The plant should be a mature plant, not a small pup or baby of a larger plant. Jim Tanner

Up to 3 plants may be entered in each of the two categories: Cactus and Succulent

Entries may be in either the Novice or Open Class

- <u>Novice</u> entries must have been held by the owner for at least <u>3 months</u>. Only plant condition will be judged, not the pot or other enhancements.
- Open entries must have been held for at least <u>1 year</u>. All aspects of the entry will be judged, including plant condition, and pot.
- <u>Note:</u> Members showing in the Open class may not enter plants in the Novice class during the year, but may re-enter the Novice class starting in January.

#### JUDGING

Entrants will receive 6 points for first place, 4 points for second place, 2 points for third place and 1 point for showing a plant that is not disqualified.

- The judge may award one 1<sup>st</sup> place and up to two 2<sup>nd</sup> and two 3<sup>rd</sup> places in each category. If plants are not deemed to be of sufficient quality, no place will be awarded.
- At the discretion of the judge and/or Mini-show Chair, a plant may be disqualified or removed due to disease of infestation or because it is not the correct genera.

Those who live in the western US should be planning
to attend the Succulent Symposium at the Huntington Library and Botanical Gardens on September 3, 2011. The annual meeting of the Society was held on July 2 at
the Huntington Library. President, Laurel Woodley recapped the last year's activities which included the successful Convention in San Diego in April. It's not too early to begin planning to attend the next Conven- tion in April 2013.
