Attendance: 88 were in attendance.

President Maria Capaldo called the meeting to order at 1:35 p.m. in Frances Young Hall. She welcomed members and guests and asked members to make sure they were signed in and put a ticket in the sprinkling can for door prize plants after the break. There were free plants on the side table and there would be a Q & A period after the talk.

Program: Jade Neely introduced today's speakers, John Martinez and Nils Schirrmacher. Their presentation was entitled "Dudleya: Succulent Diversity in Our Own Backyard." They live in Central LA and the Valley and decided to explore plants native to the area. Nils began the first half of the presentation. His curiosity about what grows here started his exploration of *Dudleyas*. He and John decided to try and locate, identify and photograph the plants in their native habitat. They limited their explorations to an hour's drive away from home. Poaching, fires and draught have affected the proliferation of *Dudleyas*. Also, the rarest ones live along the coast and the marine layer is diminishing due to climate changes. They are facing a lot of challenges. They belong to the family Crassulaceae. John picked up the second half of the presentation. There is a lot of diversity among these plants in habitat. Again, he stressed the challenges to the *Dudleya* population, including recreational activities in their habitat (rock climbing and equestrian trails), urban expansion, and illegal collecting. He says there are more plants out there that haven't been found yet and they will continue their search. A question and answer period followed.

December Potluck: We will have our holiday Potluck on Sunday, December 8th, our usual meeting day. We will start the festivities at noon and serve food at 12:30. The Society will provide meat and water; the remainder are dishes provided by members. Please bring a side dish, salad or dessert, ready to be served. After eating we will give prizes to those scoring the highest in each category for the Mini-show. Then we will judge who did the best on their Plant of the Year. So, please bring your Plant of the Year (*Haworthia maughanii X truncata*) to the Potluck, dead or alive. We also would like you to complete a questionnaire on your plants that will be in the Newsletter, as well as on the Website. Please: one person per questionnaire, as well as on the Website. We have some questionnaires at the sign-in table printed up for you to take home if you like. We do need volunteers to set up the Potluck tables, decorate and get the food lined up.

Phyllis DeCrescenzo will make centerpieces for the Potluck tables. Laurel agreed to bring Juniper for the tables. We also need volunteers to help set up the tables and decorate them. A few members raised their hands to help. If you are volunteering for this, please arrive between 10:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. A thank you to Dennis Emerson for helping with the tables. We also need help organizing in the kitchen.

Announcements before the break: Cory Zedler's name was chosen to announce free plant winners and George Urnine's name was chosen to help judge the Mini-show. Please sign your name on the list in the kitchen if you brought food today.

Announcements after the break: Maria reconvened the meeting at 3:20 p.m.

Mini-show: Nils Shirrmacher announced the Mini-show winners, aided by Jim Tanner. This month's plants were: Cactus: Columnar Cacti and Succulent: *Pelargonium*, *Sarcocaulon* and *Tylecodon*.
