Minutes of the General Zoom Meeting, May 9, 2021

The meeting was convened at 1:30 pm and was being recorded for YouTube. The Club's Zoom meeting was co-hosted by our President, Maria Capaldo and Scott Bunnell from the Long Beach Cactus Club. Maria welcomed everyone to the meeting and wished a Happy Mother's Day to all and hoped for an enjoyable day. She thanked Scott for hosting this meeting.

Program:

"Getting to Know Kalanchoe." Jade introduced our speaker, Laurel Woodley, as a great teacher. This is an updated version of her talk from May 2015. Jade says she understands more about *Kalanchoes* because of Laurel's presentation.

Laurel began by explaining the facts about these succulents. They are from the family Crassulaceae and there are about 136 species. Their natural habitat is mainly in Madagascar and East and South Africa. They like a semi-arid environment. She showed us photos of the horticultural *K. blossfeldiana* then spoke about species plants. There are species where the flowers face upwards, some kalanchoes reaching up to four feet tall. *K. rhombopilosa* is speckled and striped; *K. eriophylla* has fuzzy leaves; and some have a seasonal "blush" color to their leaves in winter. *K. orgyalis* has a rusty to metallic blue color to its leaves. *K. luciae* has cluster of white flowers and leaves edged in red. "Fantastic" is festive in the garden.

Some species have their flowers hanging down. Bryophyllums (sprouting leaves) form plantlets along the leaf margins. They sport bell-like pendant flowers. *K. prolifera* from Madagascar has pinnate leaves and the flower sepals are longer than the petals. *K. daigremontiana* has flowers in every leaf margin which all fall off and propagate heartily. *K. manginii* is loaded with pendant flowers and is good for planting in hanging baskets, as is *K. uniflora*.

Points to remember when landscaping with *Kalanchoes*: they are frost tender; make good container subjects; tend to grow best in winter and spring; they mix well with other succulents; have a variety of shapes and colors and can show seasonal color changes.

Laurel ended her presentation at 2:25 pm. A question and answer period followed that lasted for ten minutes. Maria reminded us that the talk can be viewed again on YouTube, where it can be stopped and started so viewers can take screen shots of the Kalanchoes.

May Brag and Garden Plants: Maria showed photos submitted by Club members of their favorite plants from their gardens. She thanked those participating for sharing their plants and asked members to keep sending in their photos. Jennifer said that she would share plantlets of Kalanchoe with anyone interested. May Plant-of-the-Month: Maria gave a photo presentation of the Plants-of-the-month which were: Cactus: *Coryphantha*, *Escobaria* and *Acharagma*; and Succulents: *Dudleya* and *Cotyledon*. Maria said although there were a lot of photos submitted this month, very few people had examples of *Coryphantha*. No one had *Escobaria* and only Gary had *Acharagma*. There were lots of *Dudleyas* and some *Cotyledons*.
