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"Exploring Euphorbia"

Euphorbias are some of the most popular species at all Cactus and Succulent Shows. This genus is worldwide, with members on every continent except Antarctica. This talk will take a look at some of the species from South Africa, Madagascar, the Mediterranean, and the Americas, concentrating on the similarities and differences in these geographically disparate regions. The presentation will include a look at mutant forms and conclude with a section on cultivation and propagation.

Tom Glavich is a long-time grower and propagator of succulent plants. He was a member of the CSSA Board of Directors and is the author of two books on succulent plants. He is one of the co-chairs of the Inter-City Cactus and Succulent Show held the first weekend of August at the Los Angeles County Arboretum. He is a contributor to the Mini Show descriptions in the Prickly News-Newsletter of the South Coast Cactus and Succulent Society.

Monthly Cactus: Rebutia

Rebutia is a genus in the family Cactaceae, native to Bolivia and Argentina. They are generally small, colorful cacti, globular in form, which freely produce flowers that are relatively large in relation to the body. They have no distinctive ribs, but do have regularly arranged small tubercles. They are considered fairly easy to grow and they may produce large quantities of seeds that germinate freely around the parent plant.

The limits of the genus are currently uncertain – in particular whether or not it includes species formerly or currently placed in the genera Aylostera, Cintia, Sulcorebutia and Weingartia. The number of species included varies widely from source to source. A very large number of plants that have been treated in cultivation as species of Rebutia are now generally regarded as varieties, forms or synonyms of a much smaller number of species.

Rebutia and Sulcorebutia are both genera from the highlands of Bolivia and Northern Argentina. They are similar in appearance, in habitat and culture. Coming from high altitudes, they are both tolerant of cold, and if dry, can be left out in all weather. The populations of Sulcorebutia and Rebutia overlap, but no natural hybrids are known.

There has been debate from the start on whether or not Sulcorebutia and Rebutia are the same genus. Some would combine the two under Rebutia, others would rather split Rebutia into several genera. The issue will ultimately be settled by genetic studies. For the present they are treated as separate genera, and they appear

this way in almost all references, catalogs and show schedules. Both genera cover large altitude ranges, and many species are so variable that collections from nearby populations, or even the same population at different times have been given different names. There are far more names than species. The books by John Pilbeam help make sense of the species and varieties.

Both genera are easily grown. They are dormant in winter, and start to grow in late March or April. They flower from April through June, with the peak flowering period varying from year to year depending on the weather. Two flowering cycles are common in cultivation in California. The flowers are almost always numerous, and vary in color from purple and red through orange to yellow. They do well in normal compost, and grow best with steady fertilization, when in active growth. They are both attractive to spider mites. Damage can be prevented by frequent inspection, and a weekly, forceful wash down with water.

Monthly Succulent: Echeveria

Echeveria is a large genus of succulents in the Crassulaceae family, native from the mountains of Mexico to northwestern South America. The genus is named after the 18th century Mexican botanical artist, Atanasio Echeverría y Godoy. Many of the species produce numerous offsets, and are commonly known as 'Hen and chicks', which can also refer to other genera such as Sempervivum that are significantly different from Echeveria.

Many Echeveria species are popular as garden plants. They are drought resistant, although they do better with regular deep watering and fertilizing. Most will tolerate shade and some frost, although hybrid species tend to be less tolerant. They can be propagated easily by separating offsets, but may also be propagated by leaf cuttings, and by seed if they are not hybrids. Echeverias are polycarpic, meaning that they may flower and set seed many times over the course of their lifetimes.

Most lose their lower leaves in winter; as a result, after a few years, the plants lose their attractive, compact appearance and need to be rerooted or propagated. In addition, if not removed, these shed leaves may decay, harboring fungus which can then infect the plant.

flavistyla [flav-ih-STY-la] Having a yellow or yellowish style.

minuscula [min-00-SKYOO-luh] Very small. muscula [MUS-kuh-luh] Diminutive of Latin mus (mouse, or muscle).

Rebutia [ray-BEW-tee-uh] Named for Pierre Rebut, 19th century French cactus dealer and expert.

pacificus [pa-SIF-ik-um, pa-SIF-ee-kum] Of the Pacific.

platyacanthus [plat-ee-a-KAN-thus] From the Greek platys (broad) and akantha (thorn).

potatorum [poh-tuh-TOR-um] Of drinkers; referring to a plant's use in brewing beer.

texensis [teck-SEN-sis] Of or from Texas (U.S.).

agavoides [ah-gav-OH-id-eez, ah-gav-OY-deez] Like the genus Agave.

derenbergii [der-en-BERG-ee-eye] Possibly named for Dr. Julius Derenberg, 19th century German supporter of Dinter's plant collecting expeditions to South Africa.

Echeveria [ech-eh-VER-ee-a, ech-eh-ver-EE-a] Named for Anastasio Echeverria y Godoy, 18th century Spanish botanist.

imbricata [im-brih-KAY-tuh] Shingled, overlapping.

pulvinata [pul-vin-AH-tuh] Referring to a cushion.

Exhibitors must be club members and must be present at the meeting in order to receive points. One name representing the same household must be used unless plants are grown separately. Mini-show coordinator will be consulted if there is any question of entry identity.

Any container may be used, including plastic, as long as it is clean. All plants must be groomed and free of pests and disease.

There are two plant categories, "Cactus" and "Succulents". Up to three plants per individual may be entered in each category.

There are three entry classes: "Novice", "Intermediate" and "Open". Only members new to the hobby would be expected to be in the novice class. After the November meeting, members'

point totals will be reviewed by the Board of the Society. Novice members awarded more than 64 points or winning at least 6 first place awards will be asked to move to the Intermediate class in both categories. Intermediate Members awarded more than 64 points or winning at least 6 first place awards, will be asked to begin showing in the Open class.

All plants must be grown by the exhibitor

for a minimum of six months for novice and intermediate and one year for open class. An individual plant may

be entered only once a year

Scoring:

First Place: 6 points Second place: 4 points Third place: 2 points

Placement: all entries that are not disqualified receive one point
